Eric HELLEINER is Associate Professor for Political Science at the University of Waterloo (Ontario) and Chair in International Governance at Waterloo's Centre for International Governance Innovation (CIGI). His research interests include international political economy, international money and finance, North-South economic relations, history of political economy and North American integration. Helleiner is the author of *States and the Reemergence of Global Finance* (1994), *The Making of National Money* (2003), and *Towards North American Monetary Union?* (2006), among others.
